"Bloom Where You Are Planted" It can mean various things depending on its usage. To be fruitful, blossom, become all you were created to be. Make the best of what you have when life throws lemons at you. Do what's

right, even when it's hard. Each has their place and even corresponding Scripture. 1. Be Fruitful: Saint Francis de Sales (1567-1622), when he was the Bishop of Geneva is recorded as saying this: "Truly charity has no limit; for the love of God has been poured into our hearts by His Spirit dwelling in each one of us, calling us to a life of devotion and inviting us to bloom in the garden where He has planted and directing us to radiate the beauty and spread the fragrance of His Providence." 2. Make the Best of Life: Using the phrase in this way encourages resilience. Sometimes life is hard. Things don't always go according to plan. Even in less than wonderful situations, we have control over how we respond. Blooming where we are planted is to make the choice to respond in a positive manner. It's in agreement with another familiar phrase about making lemonade when life throws you lemons. When many Israelites were exiled to Babylon, they were in a less than wonderful situation. But God told them, in a way, to bloom where they were planted for that time.

"This is what the Lord Almighty, the God of Israel, says to all those I carried into exile from Jerusalem to Babylon: 'Build houses and settle down; plant gardens and eat what they produce. Marry and have sons and daughters; find wives for your sons and give your daughters in marriage, so that they too may have sons and daughters. Increase in number there; do not decrease. Also, seek the peace and prosperity of the city to which I have carried you into exile. Pray to the Lord for it, because if it prospers, you too will prosper'" (Jeremiah 29:4-7).

3. Do What's Right: Doing what's right when it's hard is — hard. Perhaps that's why Paul gives this instruction in 1 Corinthians 7: 20-24, which is another place we find the sentiment of blooming where we are planted. Blooming where you are planted doesn't mean you can't improve yourself or must stay stuck in an awful place. Let me remind you of the line above, "if you can gain your freedom. do so".
